Dear Permit Holder:

Wisconsin Act 126 goes into effect April 1, 2007 and will require all customers applying for a Wisconsin Driver License or Identification Card to provide acceptable proof of U.S. Citizenship or lawful immigration status in the United States. We want to be sure our customers understand the new law and how it may impact their ability to get a Driver License or Identification Card.

Until April 1, 2007, there is no requirement in Wisconsin that you prove legal presence in the United States to receive a Wisconsin Driver License or Identification Card.

Instruction Permit holders who are unable to prove U. S. citizenship or lawful immigration status in the United States will not be able to schedule a driving (road) test on or after April 1, 2007. Our automated road test scheduling system located at; www.dot.wisconsin.gov/drivers/drivers/schedule.htm will require those seeking a road test appointment on or after April 1, 2007, to enter their social security number.

If you have lawful immigration status in the United States on or after April 1, 2007, but are not eligible for a federal government issued Social Security Number, you will need to schedule your driving (road) test appointment at a DMV Service Center. You must bring proof of lawful immigration status in the United States to the DMV Service Center.

Acceptable documents that prove U.S. citizenship or lawful immigration status include:

- U.S. state issued certification of birth
- Valid U.S. passport
- Valid foreign passport with federal form I-94, arrival and departure record.
- Certificate of U.S. citizenship (federal form N560)
- U.S. certificate naturalization (federal form N550)
- Valid federal form I-551, resident alien registration receipt card issued since 1997
- Valid federal form I-688, temporary resident identification card
- Valid federal forms I-688B or I-766, employment authorization documents
- Valid federal form I-571, refugee travel document
- Federal form I-797, notice of action
- Transportation Worker Identification Credential (TWIC card)
- U.S. department of state reception and placement program assurance form (refugee)
